What You Can Do...

- Children need to know they are loved. Show affection in words & actions.
- Don't argue in front of them or involve them in adult problems. Create spaces where children are protected from conflict.
- to cooperate to meet your children's needs. Don't criticize or disagree in front of your children. You need Allow children to have a relationship with both parents.
- Share needed information with your children.

Talk about custody & other decisions that affect your children. Remember... what they need to know will depend on their age.

- a regular schedule (ex: hockey practice, ballet lessons). Keep your children's routines in place. Do your best to maintain
- experience all the emotions you do. Listen without interrupting. Let your children express feelings. Recognize they
- choices. Young children can choose their clothes or toys. Older children can choose which sports to play & set Give children a say in their lives. Listen & give appropriate visiting times
- Keep your promises. Your children will need to know they can rely on you.
- Give children time to visit with relatives & spend time with friends.
- Take care of yourself. Your children are depending on you.
